The conceptual framework is the big idea that weaves the development and design aspects of the project together into a visitor experience that is unique, cohesive, and compelling. Wild ideas, Wild Connections is an embodiment of the active culture of Central Oregon and highlights the harmony between people and place.

Grounded in the outdoors and the environment, the zones developed for Visitor Experience Plan highlight unexpected connections and create opportunities to forge new ones. Visitors will climb into a volcano, go on micro-adventures through the Cascades, float an inner tube down the Deschutes, and find their inner rockhound in a lava tube. Through these creative learning and play experiences, children will hone their understanding of STEAM concepts and their natural environment while connecting to the community.

about CMCO

United under a vision to provide hands-on, STEAM-focused learning experiences that would benefit their community both culturally and economically, a group of enthusiastic parents and professionals came together in 2015 to form the Children's Museum of Central Oregon (CMCO). Since then, CMCO has been a learning institution and a museum without walls offering interactive educational experiences through summer camps, free pop-up museum events, festivals, and community fundraisers.

In collaboration with Gyroscope Inc., a museum planning and design firm, the team is on the path to permanently establish a cornerstone of creative, accessible STEAM learning and play in Bend. As the only region in the state without a children's museum. CMCO aims to be a resource for families and schools in Central Oregon, providing opportunities for play and learning experiences and programs otherwise unavailable.

regional context

Central Oregon is comprised of Deschutes, Crook, and Jefferson counties. Bend and Central Oregon have grown exponentially over the past decade with over 15% of residents being under the age of 14. Families and individuals visit and relocate here from major technology, art and science-oriented cities like Portland, Seattle, Denver, L.A., and the Bay Area.

The natural landscape is a key part of the Central Oregon's identity. The unique geology and geography include ancient lava flows, mountain peaks, vast forests, and an arid high desert. Famous for its wondrous and expansive beauty, the region is a mecca for year-round outdoor adventures.





key learning strategies



SCIENCE AROUND US

Explore world around you and uncover the everyday WOW in your own backyard! By engaging in real-world experiences with familiar entry points, visitors learn how to interact with the environment and hone in on a stronger sense of place. By magnifying the STEAM connections and concepts of Central Oregon's life, culture, environment, and future, visitors develop stronger ties to community and appreciation for the natural world.

Key Learning Strategies are ways that the Museum's audience learns. These strategies help create coherence across the Museum, strengthen its learning value, and serve as a guide for CMCO when creating experiences, environments, and exhibits.



THINKING WITH YOUR BODY

Run, jump, stretch, and roll! If you are moving you are learning! When children and adults explore and navigate through small and large, high and low spaces, they develop awareness of their body's capacities, strengths, and physical risk. As visitors use their hands, work with tools, and explore materials, they are thinking, creating, and making sense of the world.

CREATIVE AGENCY

You have the power to create! Taking ownership over their own learning and focusing on personal fascination with content, aesthetics, and strategies, leads to an impetus for life-long learning in individuals. Visitors, both children and adults, are emboldened to impact the space, take risks, persist through challenges, and celebrate failure as part of the learning process.

PLAY TOGETHER, LEARN TOGETHER

Cultivate community and a culture of curiosity! Bringing people together through shared activities nurtures relationships. Visitors partake in community building through sharing ideas, working collaboratively, making new friends, linking generations, and engaging families from diverse backgrounds.

4. VISITOR EXPERIENCE

experience types

Experience types are a set of varied experiences whose qualities reflect CMCO's diverse needs and goals. Each experience type has a physical space associated with it.

Most exhibits reflect more than one type and each zone includes the full set of experience types. By providing a variety of experiences, the Museum invites visitor engagement across a wide spectrum of learning styles and entry points.

INVESTIGATION STATION

Visitors tap into their own innate curiosities through open-ended exploration and experimentation.

WHIMSICAL WOW (ICONIC)

The iconic "you have to go see" big wow that serves as a share-worthy anchor point for visitors as they take their experience back into the world.

ROOM FOR IMAGINATION

Visitors invent and act out characters, scenarios, and stories with inspiration from costumes, props, and immersive themed environments.

CREATIVE COLLABORATION

Visitors come together to collaborate and create their own exhibit experiences in a group setting. The environment continuously evolves, changes, and grows.

DISTRIBUTED EARLY CHILDHOOD

Scaffolded experiences give access to the youngest visitors and their caregivers.

QUIET SPACE

Special places to enjoy quiet time, low sensory experiences, or respite from over-stimulation.


DESIGN REFERENCES

LAVA TUBE

- You're pretty high up. Can you make it to the other end of the lava tube?
- Looping tubes provide challenge of being suspended over thin air.

ERUPTING VENT

- · Mimicking one of the many branching pipes, visitors can make the vent erupt with mist.
- Push down together to launch a cloud ring up to the ceiling, creating something extraordinary as a team.

MAGMA CHAMBER

- Scoot, shuffle, and crawl through the heart of the volcano! This special space promotes different ways of maneuvering your body through a unique environment.
- Flowing landscape evokes movement, chutes, caves with unexpected forms that can be climbed over and under.



The Sisters reach of the Cascade arc contains at least 466 volcanoes that erupted within the past one million years.





















CRATER

- · You reached the pinnacle!! How's the view?
- Look out and down from this raised gathering space at the top of the climber.
- This accessible 'high' experience connects Vent, stair and slide with staff access to 2nd floor.

LAVA FLOW SLIDE

- · Visitors are flowing out of the 2-story slide like lava!
- The Crater and the top of the slide are accessible from the building 2nd floor to allow ADA access.
- Slides provide an immediate boost of activity, are great for brain development, and provide an accessible full-body experience. Sliding can help improve a child's balance as they process their location as they slide.

LAVA BALLS

- Climb through the path of these great balls of fire to discover the vibrant surprises awaiting inside!
- This network of dark gray spheres contains vibrant interiors for visitors to discover and navigate through.
- This feature provides an element of discovery and special spaces visitors to hangout.




Lava balls are chunks of molten rock that rolled through the lava flow and grew in size just like a snowball rolling downhill.













CENTRAL PIPE

- Visitors rise like lava as they ascend the central Magma Chamber to the Crater lookout high above.
- A switch-back climbing tower poses vertical navigation challenges.

CAREGIVER ROUTES

 Adjacent and parallel routes for caregivers allow for groups and families to stay together as they traverse the climber experience at their own pace and abilities.

WAYS OF MOVING, WAYS OF THINKING

 The body is a tool for learning. Multiple ways to move encourage different ways of thinking and problem solving with your body.




Most are of the 466 volcanoes in The Sisters reach are small single-eruption volcanic vents, though there are a few are low shields and stratocones such as Broken Top.



















THUNDEREGG KALEIDOSCOPE

- Create your own mesmerizing geological structure inside a giant walk-in kaleidoscope!
- Turn the LED lights to change the colors, shapes, and patterns.
- In this immersive experience, you shape your own magical world.

FAIRY CASTLES

- You can finally play with the fairy castle sand found in lava tubes!
- Use light projection over an undulating playscape. Moveable seating allows visitor to manipulate and inhabit their creations.
- This activity has multiple entry points for imaginative play.

ICE FORMATIONS

- You won't freeze your hands on these touchable ice crystals!
- These inflatable shapes each have sensors that let visitors control sounds and light through pushing and pulling the shapes.
- This interactive music system supports developmental play and multi-sensory therapy.



The thunderegg is Oregon's State rock. They are found in flows of ryholite lava and come in a variety of colors.



















ROCKHOUNDS

- As one of the best places to find crystals, minerals, and volcanic glass, geology rocks hard in Central Oregon.
- In collaborative sharing stations, groups of visitors can investigate real rocks with space to draw, analyze, measure, and catalogue together.
- Hands-on exploration is supported by video microscope, sorting bins, specimens, field guides, and books.
- · Visitors move and shape the landscape in augmented reality sandboxs to play with lava flow.
- Programmatic area allows for supervised Rockhound tool usage.

GEODE GEOMETRIES

- · The littles can rock on, too!
- This Early-Childhood focused area gives younger visitors a chance to explore shapes and patterns in age-appropriate activities.



"Rockhounds" is the term given to amateur geologist. It is popular hobby among Central Oregonians.

















LOOKOUT TOWER

- · You are on fire spotter duty. What do see up there?
- Role play being fire spotters at Lava Butte. Explore mapping, weather, fire control, communication, and general living.
- Visitors hone in observation skills, use scientific tools, and learn about the life of a National Forest fire lookout.

ROCK MUSIC

- We need music to rock out! Visitors explore the sounds of rocks through melodic percussion and physical programming.
- Playable lithophone (stone xylophone) from volcanic rocks and circular looper with sampled sounds from the lava fields provide high and low-tech musical experiences.

QUIET CAVES

Take a break from rocking out in these cozy pods.



An Oregon invention! William Bushnell Osborne Jr. invented the "firefinder." This tool helps foresters estimate the location of fire from the lookout tower.

- · Where did the water go?
- Explore dams, gates, flumes, and the porosity of materials.
- Water supply education is coupled with place-based historical tie-in to Tumalo Dam.



GENERATING POWER

- · Harness the power of hydroelectric energy.
- Use reservoirs and turbine propellers to explore potential and kinetic energy.
- Connection to local renewable energy lessons, the Old Mill, and Low Impact Hydropower (Juniper Ridge Hydro-Electric, run-of-the-river).





IRRIGATION

- · Your crops need water but not too much!
- Build, repair, and replace canal systems to pull water from the river to farm fields.
- Visitors learn about responsible water usage in agriculture through cause and effect of displacing water.



Now a historic landmark, Tumalo Dam was a failed project as 90% of the volume of the reservoir was swallowed through the porous lava rock.





















ANIMALS AND HABITATS

- Spot the spotted frog and build your own beaver dam. Go fly fishing or be a fish yourself!
- Loose parts encourage imaginary play and storytelling around homes and habitats of iconic river residents like beavers, trout, and osprey.
- Flexible platforms and changeable elements allow for diverse stories centered on the Central Oregon watershed.
- Pop-up in an under water bubble for a different perspective to life beneath the river.
- · Visitors engage in open-ended investigation as an entry point into earth sciences.
- Exposure to local science and themes of conservation promotes stewardship of the natural world.



The beaver is the official state animal of Oregon.
They are known as nature's engineers and important for erosion control.















CASCADES

- The Cascades are the source of the Deschutes River.
 In our water table, they are also the source of non-stop fun!
- Stand inside the mountain to get a view of the rushing waterfall above you.
- Accessible entry for visitors creates opportunities for all to experience the awe of natural phenomena.

RAPIDS AND EDDIES

- Can your mini tube, raft, or canoe make it though the rapids!?
- · Create an obstacle course with the gates and barriers. Navigate your vessel through the currents.
- · Visitors create challenges that affect the ebb and flow of the river.

MIRROR POND

- · Take a moment to reflect in the Mirror Pond.
- · Visitors can calmly play with and view the reflections of the water against light.
- Quiet space provides opportunities for water play for a younger audience and those with sensory sensitivities.

SNOWBALL

- It's a winter wonderland of physics and engineering!
- Visitors use 'snowballs' to explore cause and effect systems (screws, vacuums, conveyors, funnels, etc.) with a central goal of filling the snowball tower at the top of the mountain and creating an avalanche.
- · Visitors will learn about avalanche science and the local weather technology.
- Moveable pieces on a magnetic wall can be manipulated to create ball - run trails.
- These collaborative and creative experiences allow for inclusive entry points for all to enjoy the local adventure sports.

SNOWCAT

- I want to drive!
- In this imaginative play opportunity, take the helm or ride with a buddy in these iconic snow vehicles.



Mt. Bachelor has since grown to be one of the largest ski resorts in the U.S.





















CATCHING AIR

- · Experiment with how to 'ride' air flow.
- Use mini-boards in a Bernoulli blower to explore physics of boarding in powder, kayaking, etc.
- Place-based loose parts allow for iterative exploration focused around uplift and drag while connecting to local aviation and recreation.

TRIALS AND TRAILS

- Visitors gamify adventure sport using magnetic arcade systems like pinball. Modular components allow for creative combinations of trails and challenges.
- Combining open-ended play with arcade-like adventure allows for accessible engagement with a myriad of outdoors activities.

CIRCUIT TRAINING

- Visitors engage circuits through the familiar entry point of bike lights and components.
- This exhibit creates a place-based connection to local bike culture and provides a guiet space for visitors to tinker.



WESTERN JUNIPER (STORIES)

- Gather under the cozy canopy of juniper branches to share stories and connect with fellow caregivers.
- The circular gathering place provides a space for programs as well as a safe area for pre-walkers to explore independently.

PONDEROSA PINE (COLLECTING)

- · Climb into the treehouse and help the critters collect the pinecones.
- Inside the Treehouse visitors collect 'pine cones' (balls) and use chutes and ramps to explore cause and effect.
- · Sorting, classifying, and categorizing objects helps build visual perception, memory, and thinking skills.



Ponderosa Pine has deep furrows in the bark and often smells like butterscotch or vanilla.

















DOUGLAS FIR (TEXTURE)

- · Touch the fluffy moss, bumpy bark, and squishy mushrooms!
- This platform (nicknamed "Doug") offers multi-faceted sensory play.
 Visitors can crawl through the inside tunnel of the fallen tree and see their reflection in the mirror base. On the exterior, soft textures and Velcro fungus, moss, and wood patterns offer tactile stimuli.
- Physical contact with different objects helps children make sense of world and supports kinesthetic learning.

WESTERN LARCH & VINE MAPLE (LIGHT)

- · Leaves change colors, why can't you?!
- Play with colored lights to change the color of the room. Watch maple leaves' shadows float in the air column.
- Visual sensory stimulation aid hand-eye coordination and development of cognition and recognition.

QUAKING ASPEN (SOUND)

- Dance and shake with excitement as you move along to the music of the Aspens.
- Visitors can make music with a variety of shaking sound makers. Canopy scrims above and below create an immersive and fort-like aspen tree adventure.

POND & STREAM

- · Bounce, scooch, and roll on this squishy pond-like waterbed.
- Hear the splash of the water beneath you as you engage your whole body in this multisensory experience.



Quaking Aspen get their names from their leaves that appear to shake and tremble in the wind.










- Engage your olfactory sense and take a closer sniff!

The science behind food

It is time to get cookin'. Visitors are brought together to explore the world of food in this multi-sensory lab space. This real kitchen environment includes sinks, tools, and equipment to investigate and understand the science behind the everyday food we grow, cook, and eat. Make connections to the plants growing in the Greenhouse outside and develop an understanding of where our food comes from.

Kitchen Lab is programmed for open-ended daily activities, school trips, special events, and classes.

The Museum partners with local organizations to connect community through performing arts, special events, pop-up planetarium experiences, laser light shows, and more. Offering retractable theater seating and open space, the Dark Skies Theater is a place for creativity to run free.
